## 2023 Education

This year we saw students from grades K- 12, scout troops, and summer camps. Many groups contributed stewardship projects to help remove invasive honeysuckle and help plant native trees.

Students explored the site on hikes, helped remove invasive species and plant native trees and seeds, explored the world of worm composting, dissected owl pellets, played fun environmental-themed games, and more!

### Highlight



This volunteer group from OmniLife came out with family and friends to plant 14 trees in December! It took them less than 2 hours to get the 8-10 ft trees planted along the newly paved River Greenway Trail. This mix of oak and catalpa trees will provide a good source of habitat to wildlife and be a great source of shade for passersby!

## 2023 Site Management

The AmeriCorps team and our hardworking volunteers have continued to chip away at our honeysuckle invasion! They have made a significant impact along the newly paved River Greenway Trail, clearing out large sections and treating the freshly cut stumps with herbicide to prevent regrowth. For regular visitors, the difference may be stark: what was once a dense understory is now opened up. This is great news for native species! There is plenty of space and sunlight for wildflowers and young trees to move in and reclaim the space.

Staff and volunteers have also started beautifying the River Greenway area. The garden around the River Greenway sign has been replanted with flowers and shrubs that will provide year-round color and wildlife interest. Native grasses and wildflowers are also being planted along the edges of the paved trail and landscaping efforts will continue through 2024.

Readers of our last newsletter will recall a highlight of volunteers installing new nest boxes and bat houses around the property in spring 2023. This winter, staff mounted volunteer-constructed barred owl boxes around the property as part of our continued efforts to improve habitat for local wildlife. See if you can spot them from the trails!

Wildlife aren't the only ones seeing upgrades on the trails! NIBCO and BIMBO Bakeries generously donated several new benches for visitors to enjoy. New trash and recycling bins will also be making a debut.

Inside the Visitor's Cabin there are new digital displays that cycle through information about upcoming programs, picture and video highlights from volunteers and past events, and a live feed breakdown of the solar and wind power generated onsite. See page 9 for details!

Last, but not least, some show-stopping pervious pavers were installed along the parking lot and up to the pavilion. These pavers allow rain and water collected on the parking lot to drain into our rain garden, preventing erosion and pollution from runoff and watering our native plants. If the ground below the EEC wasn't clay-capped, the pervious pavers would also help rain replenish our groundwater. As an added bonus, they look great and make our pavilion more accessible than ever!






# Exploring some FAQs: Frequent Anxieties/Qualms about E.V.s

EVs are more expensive than regular ICE (Internal Combustion Engine) cars...

Over their lifetime EVs are typically less expensive than ICE cars for 2 reasons: cost of electricity vs. gas, and ICE cars require more frequent and involved maintenance due to their construction

and components. However, EVs tend to come with more upfront costs: new EVs are more expensive than new ICE cars (but EVs are eligible for up to \$7,500 tax credit), and that can influence insurance rates. EV technology is constantly improving and becoming more affordable. The least expensive EV model on the market now is the 2023 Chevrolet Bolt at \$27,495 (\$19,995 after tax credit), not much more than the least expensive ICE car, the 2024 Nissan Versa at \$17,245.



#### Range Anxiety: They don't have a big enough driving range and there aren't enough chargers...

The average range for an EV is around 250 miles/charge. The longest range for an EV on the market today is 516 miles. A typical range for ICE cars is between 300-400 miles. On average, drivers only rack up about 40 miles/day.

Currently, the *longest* distance between public chargers in Indiana is around 70 miles (similar to national average), but most are much closer together and chargers are constantly being added around the country. Indiana is planning to invest nearly \$100 million to add more EV chargers.

#### Even if it has a decent range, it will take forever to charge...

Public use chargers are typically Level 2 (4-10 hours to charge 80% from empty/10-20 miles per hour of charging) and Level 3/DC Fast Chargers (20 min - 1 hour to charge 80% from empty/180-240 miles per hour charging).


#### It gets too cold here--the batteries will never hold a charge...

Below freezing temperatures can sap as much as 25% of range, which wouldn't affect day-to-day driving if you're plugging in at home, but could add some charging stops to long-distance trips. Parking inside or adding a battery blanket can help reduce the impact.

RECOMMENDATION: Destroy eggs on sight; report Invasive plants and animals have a devastating impact on ecosystems and economies. Invasive plants take over areas and out-compete native plants, becoming the only thing growing in that area. Invasive animals overfeed on local plant/animal populations. Both invasive plants and animals can quickly become destructive and expensive adversaries.

Invasive species are a community enemy: they impact large swathes of land at a time and everyone can make a difference in the fight against them.
